A LOOK AT THE YEAR 2018

Pro Helvetia's activities in 2018 continued to focus on promoting cultural diversity and cultural exchange. Among others, the Arts Council strengthened its cultural contacts with South America through its «COINCIDENCIA» programme and promoted more European cooperation in the performative arts. Important events included the anniversaries of three of its liaison offices and the awarding of the Golden Lion to the Swiss Pavilion at the 16th International Architecture Biennale in Venice.

CULTURE ESTABLISHES CONNECTIONS

Charles Beer, Chairman of the Board of Trustees



The year 2018 was marked by the discussion about the increasing importance of borders and by the growing resistance to the consequences of globalisation. These political developments make it even more important for culture to assume its essential role in society and to uphold various core values: openness, dialogue and bridge-building. Its mediating and critical role is essential at all levels today, whether international, continental, national or regional. Culture, in its own way, can contribute to understanding that we can only meet the current political, environmental and economic challenges if we address them simultaneously at the local and at the global level.

Pro Helvetia is more than aware of this responsibility and is doing all it can to ensure that art and culture in their many forms have the necessary place in society. From creation to promotion, the Arts Council develops its activities in the various regions of Switzerland and also worldwide. It supports Swiss artists and the dissemination of their works with the intention of promoting their artistic development, giving them creative freedom and making them better known at home and abroad.

In this sense, the Board of Trustees performs its duties in the interest of Swiss art and culture with great commitment. Its nine members reflect both Switzerland's linguistic diversity and gender parity, as well as pos-

sess the cultural and operational skills required for an organisation like Pro Helvetia. We are therefore delighted that in 2018 we were able to welcome three new, highly qualified members — Françoise König Gerny, Marie-Thérèse Bonadonna and Hannes Gassert — who will make a significant contribution to fulfilling our mandate.

Pro Helvetia supports Swiss artists and the dissemination of their works with the intention of promoting their artistic development, giving them creative freedom and making them better known at home and abroad.



«OPENING UP AND KEEPING OPEN CREATIVE SPACES»

Networks shape our everyday lives. In the highly mobile world of art and culture, forms of cooperation are widespread. Artists network across borders, be they disciplinary, geographical or social.

One of Pro Helvetia's central tasks as the Swiss Arts Council is not only to identify and facilitate important networks, but also to ensure that artists are able to create a lasting impact and to achieve resonance in the spaces thereby created. In times of worldwide political hardening and demarcation movements, it is indispensable to keep open free spaces for reflection and creativity. The new «COINCIDENCIA – Swiss & South American Cultural Exchanges» programme, which enabled numerous transcontinental cultural en-

counters and projects in 2018, made an important contribution in this respect. 120 projects have already been initiated or realised, in eight South American countries as well as in Switzerland, and numerous long-term cooperations have been established. Swiss artists have toured South America or have worked with local artists as part of research stays and workshops. The first pro-

ductions and activities to emerge from these cooperations have been presented in various places in Switzerland, among others, in Nyon, Basel and Zurich.

For an arts council like Pro Helvetia, however, creating impact and resonance also means advancing into new areas, both in terms of substance and of aesthetics. By establishing comprehensive support for design and interactive media, Pro Helvetia supports creative practitioners working at the interface between art, technology and business to assert themselves and their products in competitive international markets. The Swiss Arts Council accounts for these needs with a specific funding model designed to interrelate culture and business. In 2018, this approach achieved promising results: A total of 125 young game and design studios presented their sponsored creations and products at international trade fairs in San Francisco, Shenzhen, Paris, Milan and London, and thereby received direct feedback from retailers and industry.

Such projects, which are also commercially successful, ought not to disguise the fact that culture and its promotion can and should never function according to the rules of the classical market. This is because artists often operate in small niches and networks that are significant in their field and ensure that new forms of expression can emerge. One example is "Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival". While perhaps not known to a wider audience, it is one of the world's most important platforms for new and

experimental music. Pro Helvetia is delighted to have been able to support contemporary Swiss music in gaining great international attention thanks to several years of collaboration with this festival.

Sometimes, however, it may only take very few people to create resonance. Personally, I was particularly pleased last year by the commitment

of the Geneva festival «Les Créatives», which spontaneously organised two panel discussions on the pressing issue of «Equal opportunities in culture». Considering the many events that we supported in 2018, this may appear to be a mere footnote to our activities. But it is precisely such well-targeted initiatives, motivated by current issues in cultural policy, that carry important concerns into new networks and enable us to think about tomorrow from today - always through alert interaction with the respective social, economic and political circumstances. For that is the real raison d'être of cultural promotion: to deal actively and openly with the important questions of the present, in order to set the course for the future.

II. OUR MISSION IN SWITZERLAND

Supporting Swiss artistic creation in all its diversity and ensuring its dissemination across Switzerland's different language regions are at the heart of Pro Helvetia's activities. The Arts Council is also committed to giving new impetus to cultural life through its initiatives. Pro Helvetia supports projects of national significance.

Supporting emerging artists

Supporting artistic projects that promote exchange between regions and advance social cohesion.

Stimulating culture

Supporting innovative projects with a high cultural stimulus potential.

OUR ACTIVITIES IN 2018

In 2018, Pro Helvetia supported over 1600 art and cultural projects across Switzerland. In the second year of its special focus «New models of collaboration – Culture and Business», the Art Council's most important domestic measures included calls for design and interactive media projects. The new funding model successfully established itself in a short space of time.

Pro Helvetia supports CREATIVITY and thus contributes to ensuring the diversity and high quality of cultural production in Switzerland. In 2017, Pro Helvetia awarded work grants to Swiss artists to enable original creations in the disciplines of visual arts, music, dance, theatre and literature. In the field of visual arts, Pro Helvetia awards grants that cover the various phases of the creative process from research to production, including presentation. One such project was Julian Charrière's «Invitation to Disappear», which was presented at the Kunsthalle Mainz (Germany) (Fig. 4). In the field of dance, for instance, Compagnie.sh was supported with a work grant for its «Projet F», which blends circus, theatre and music.

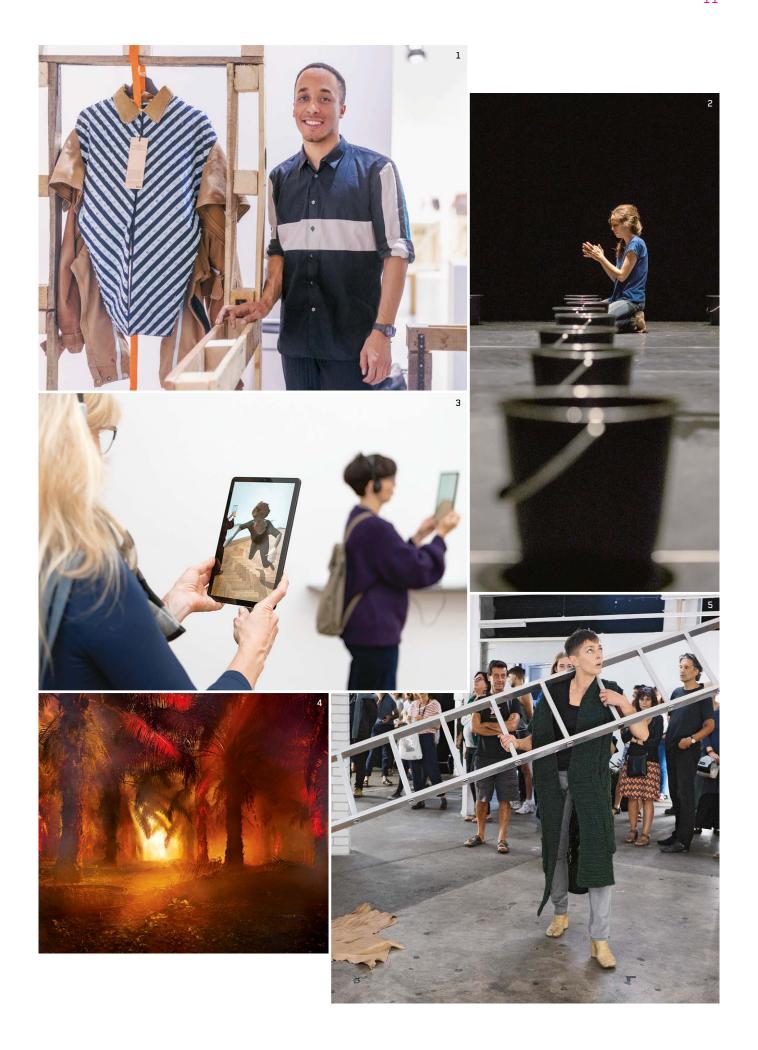
Pro Helvetia fosters ARTISTIC AND CULTURAL EXCHANGE between the various regions of Switzerland. The exhibitions, theatre and dance productions, festivals, concert cycles, translations or folk culture events backed by Pro Helvetia build bridges between different linguistic regions and cultural communities and thereby strengthen social cohesion. In 2018, for example, Pro Helvetia supported the interdisciplinary programme for performative arts at La Bâtie – Festival de Genève. This enabled six productions from German-speaking Switzerland to be presented to a French-speaking audience (Fig. 5). The first edition of Jungspund – Theatre Festival for Young Audiences in St. Gallen, which featured high-quality performances from across Switzerland, was also awarded a grant.

Pro Helvetia supports EMERGING ARTISTS and helps them access the Swiss and the international professional scene. In collaboration with its partner institutions, Pro Helvetia offers services ranging from residency and coaching programmes to grants for public presentations and promotional measures. In 2018, the Arts Council intensified its participation in international residency programmes, for instance through cooperation with the Centre National de la Danse and La Belle Ouvrage (FR) as part of its joint continuing education programme «Édition spéciale» for young choreographers (Fig. 2). Pro Helvetia also supported various art spaces in Switzerland, such as La Rada in Locarno or Milieu in Bern, in order to give young artists the opportunity to gain their first exhibition experience.

Pro Helvetia is well attuned to issues and trends in contemporary artistic creation and backs innovative projects able to provide FRESH CULTURAL STIMULUS in Switzerland. In 2018, Pro Helvetia launched the «Tandem Interkultur» call as part of its «Intercultural Society» initiative. The calls issued within the special focus «New models of collaboration – Culture and Business» attracted 168 project proposals in the field of design and 139 in the field of interactive media. Those supported included designer Rafael Kouto, who received a grant to prototype his fashion and textile collection (Fig. 1).

Pro Helvetia supports CULTURAL OUTREACH projects that are innovative in their approach, serve as examples, and encourage open-minded engagement with the arts. In 2018, for example, the Arts Council supported the educational project «Body buddies» at Kunsthalle Basel, which provided visitors an individualised exhibition experience via augmented reality. Avatars guided visitors through the exhibition space, where reality and virtuality coalesced, and offered additional explanations of the works if desired (Fig. 3).

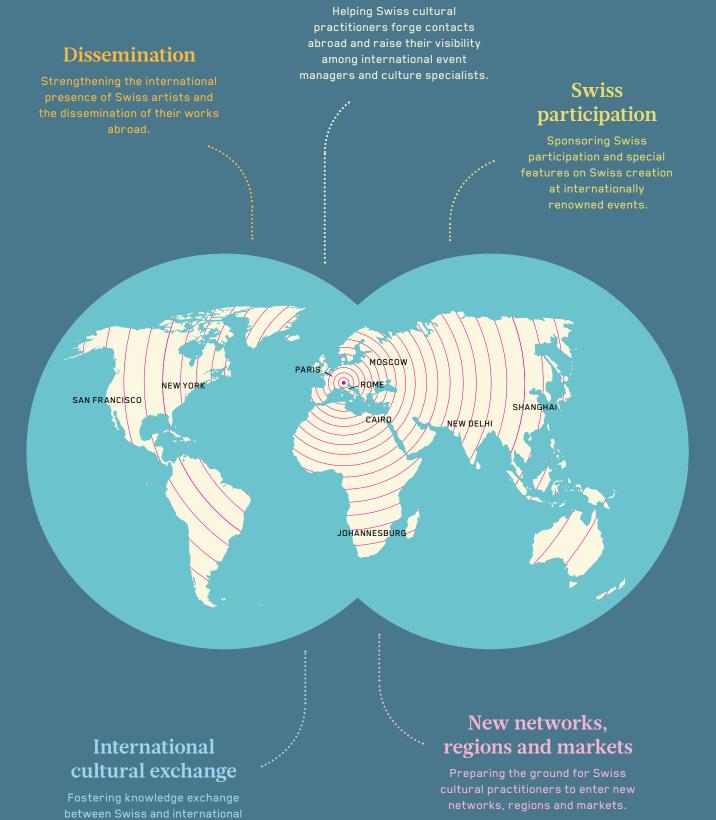

III. OUR MISSION ABROAD

Pro Helvetia supports the presentation of Swiss artistic projects abroad. It sponsors the promotion of Swiss art and culture in an international context, for example at trade fairs or biennials. Its network of offices abroad and its country programmes foster cultural exchange.

Promotion



OUR ACTIVITIES IN 2018

In 2018, Pro Helvetia supported a total of around 4500 art and cultural projects in 108 countries. Particular emphasis was placed on presenting Swiss focal programmes at important international events, as well as celebrating the anniversaries of our liaison offices in Cairo (30 years), Johannesburg (20 years) and New Delhi (10 years).

Pro Helvetia SUPPORTS THE DISSEMINATION of works by Swiss artists who have been invited by renowned institutions, event organisers or festivals abroad. Funding is provided for theatre and dance productions, concert tours, readings, exhibitions and the publication of translations of Swiss literature. In Armenia and Russia, Pro Helvetia 2018 supported the presentation of «Stimmvolk – Volksstimme», an exhibition of Swiss political campaign posters since 1918 (Fig. 2). The Arts Council also supported Christian Marclay's residency at Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival (UK), where his work «Investigations», a composition for 20 pianos, premiered (Fig. 1 p. 2).

The Arts Council implements a wide range of PROMOTIONAL MEASURES to raise awareness of Swiss cultural production among Swiss and foreign professionals. These include both online platforms, such as DESIGNSWITZERLAND.CH, launched with a view to the London Design Junction (Fig. 4 p. 3), as well as promotional events. In 2018, the Art Council's «Visiting Programme» with its liaison offices once again enabled international curators to meet young photographers as part of «Plat(t)form 18» at the Fotomuseum Winterthur. Pro Helvetia also enabled Swiss game studios to participate at «Gamescom» (Cologne, Germany) and at «Nordic Game» (Malmö, Sweden) (Fig. 4).

Pro Helvetia organises and sponsors SWISS PARTICIPATION and special features on Swiss creation at numerous internationally renowned events, fairs and biennials. In 2018, for instance, Pro Helvetia organised «Svizzera 240: House Tour», an exhibition shown in the Swiss Pavilion at the 16th Venice International Architecture Biennale and awarded the Golden Lion for the best national contribution (Fig. Cover). The Arts Council also ensured the presence of Swiss contributions at numerous important industry meetings such as the «Tanzmesse» in Düsseldorf, the «CINARS» Biennale for Stage Arts in Montreal or the «London Design Biennale» (Fig. 3). It also presented young Swiss literature as part of «Spotlight Switzerland» at the international literature festival «ilb» in Berlin.

Pro Helvetia encourages exchange with other cultures, in particular through RESIDENCIES, KNOWLEDGE EXCHANGE and cooperation projects. Swiss cultural practitioners who benefit from these measures expand their network, become familiar with other cultural contexts and gain new pro-

fessional experience. Pro Helvetia collaborates closely with its liaison offices (p. 17) and thus enables numerous cultural practitioners from various disciplines and regions to benefit from studio residencies abroad. In February, Pro Helvetia celebrated the anniversaries of three of its branch offices and, in cooperation with the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC), organised «CROSSROADS – International Perspectives on Culture, Art and Society» in Basel and Geneva (Fig. 2, p. 3). Exchanging knowledge was also the focus of the «Swiss Autumn in Russia», which offered Swiss dance professionals the opportunity to present their work in Russia and to take part in workshops and conferences (Fig. 1).

Finally, Pro Helvetia targets NEW NETWORKS, REGIONS AND MARKETS in which it identifies opportunities for intensifying exchange and for strengthening the presence of Swiss art and culture, in particular by initiating partnerships with regional organisers. In 2018, the Arts Council supported tours, exhibitions, concerts as well as research and residency programmes as part of «COINCIDENCIA - Swiss & South American Cultural Exchanges» (Fig. 5). In Europe, Pro Helvetia designed new promotional structures for London and Berlin as early as 2017, based on which the first projects took concrete shape in 2018. Among these was «Literally Swiss», a series of events in London dedicated to Swiss literary creation. In 2018, Pro Helvetia also supported projects in response to the «Performative Arts in Europe» call. These included the «Réseau européen d'accompagnement dramaturgique pour jeunes chorégraphes», established by the Théâtre Sévelin in Lausanne together with Belgian, Danish and Italian partners.

OUR OFFICES ABROAD

Pro Helvetia promotes cultural exchange between Switzerland and the outside world through its network of offices abroad. These include its liaison offices, the Centre culturel suisse run by Pro Helvetia in Paris, and several partner institutions.

The Centre culturel suisse in Paris (CCS)

Funded by Pro Helvetia, the Centre culturel suisse in Paris is dedicated to promote contemporary Swiss creation in France while supporting exchange between the countries' artistic scenes. Its two exhibition rooms, stage and bookshop provide a platform for all artistic disciplines and interdisciplinary projects. The CCS presents a multifaceted programme of over 70 events in the fields of literature, dance, theatre, music, visual arts, film and architecture each year. In 2018, for example, the Centre culturel suisse hosted «Just Another Dance», the largest exhibition to date by Swiss artist Urs Lüthi in France, which included mostly new works and ones partly produced by the CCS.

In October 2018, Jean-Marc Diébold succeeded Jean-Paul Felley and Olivier Kaeser, whose term of office as CCS directors came to an end after ten years.

Our partners

Based on support agreements, Pro Helvetia contributes funds to the cultural programmes of three Swiss partner institutions abroad: the Istituto Svizzero (IS) in Rome and its branch in Milan (WWW.ISTITUTOSVIZZERO.IT), the Swiss Institute in New York (WWW.SWISSINSTITUTE.NET) and swissnex San Francisco (WWW.SWISSNEXSANFRANCISCO.ORG). These partnerships give Swiss cultural practitioners access to local and niche networks in academia and science as well as in the creative and technological industries.

The liaison offices

Pro Helvetia's liaison offices abroad are key to the Arts Council's international cultural exchange work. The liaison offices in Cairo (since 1988), Johannesburg (since 1998), New Delhi (since 2007), Shanghai (since 2010) and Moscow (since February 2017) are stable anchor points that enable Pro Helvetia to pursue its mission of promoting Swiss art and culture throughout the world. They build on networks and local staff who observe and act on both regional and global developments. Based on a mandate from the SDC (Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation), Pro Helvetia also supports and promotes local professional arts scenes as well as regional exchange in Southern Africa. In August 2018, Lucy Lu took over the Shanghai Liaison Office from Sylvia Xu, who had headed the office since its launch in 2010.

IV. FACTS AND FIGURES

Of the CHF 42.1 million available to Pro Helvetia in 2018, 88.2% were invested directly in culture. At 11.8%, the share of administration costs was well below the federal government's strategic target of 15%. In 2018, Pro Helvetia received almost 5500 applications. The proportion of approved applications decreased again, from 48.5% in the previous year to 47.3%.

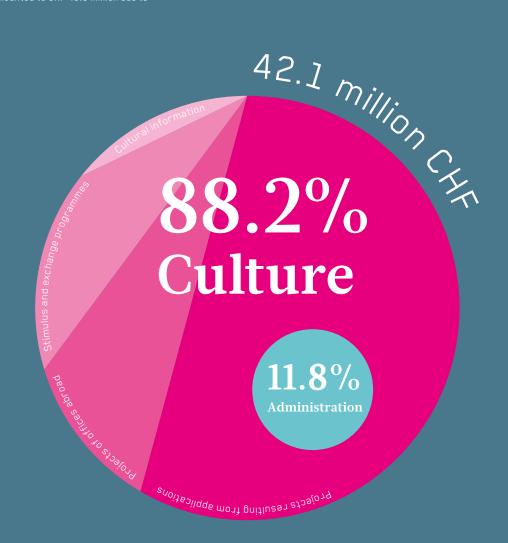
Culture – our top priority

88.2% of the CHF 42.1 million spent by Pro Helvetia in 2018 went directly to culture. Administrative costs (11.8%), calculated on the basis of ZEWO standards, remained clearly below the strategic threshold of 15% prescribed by the Swiss Confederation.

In the context of the Federal Cultural Policy Statement («Cultural Message»), Swiss Parliament grants Pro Helvetia a framework budget every four years. The Arts Council will receive CHF 210.9 million for the 2016–2020 period (a one-off five-year period). The 2018 instalment of CHF 42.3 million amounted to CHF 40.3 million due to budget cuts.



Overview of applications received

In 2018, Pro Helvetia received 5492 applications. Support was granted to projects in the visual arts, music, literature and society, theatre, dance and – subsumed under the umbrella term «Interdisciplinarity» – to cross-disciplinary projects including interactive media, design and new technologies.

One appeal was filed in 2018, on which no court ruling had yet been issued by 31 December 2018. The Federal Administrative Court has final judicial authority to hear appeals against Pro Helvetia's decisions.

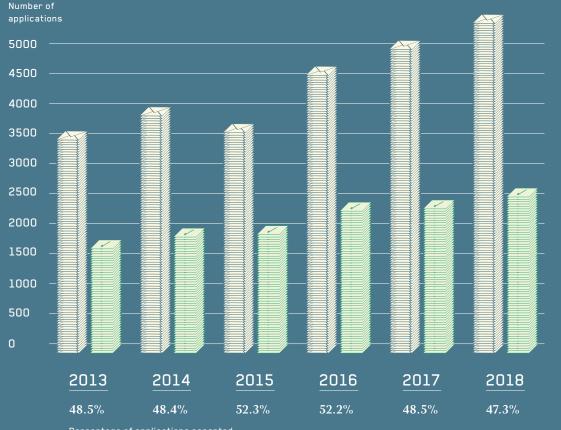

Percentage of applications accepted

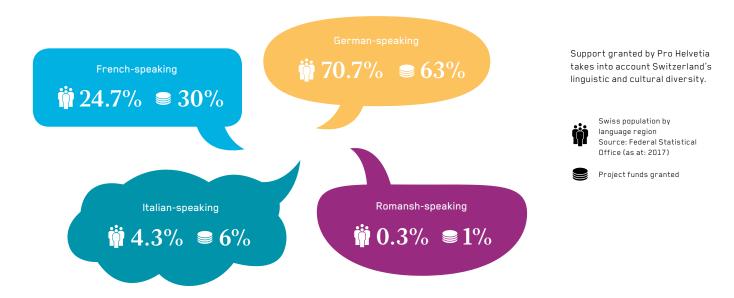

On the other hand, the additional calls, especially in the fields of design and interactive media, have also contributed to the increase.

Support granted in all regions of Switzerland

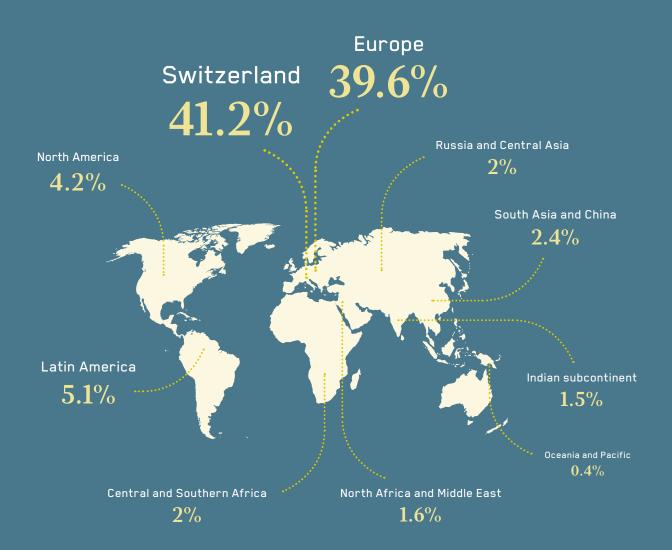
In 2018, Pro Helvetia's support helped to realise 1644 art and cultural projects in Switzerland. These were spread across 223 localities across the country – from municipalities in rural regions such as Scuol, Gelfingen or Verscio to medium-size towns such as Lenzburg, Fribourg or Locarno and densely populated urban centres such as Bern, Geneva, Basel or Zurich.

V. ORGAN-ISATION
